

December 14, 2025: Third Sunday of Advent



"Happy is the one who does not lose faith in me."

Today is known as Gaudete Sunday – meaning "Rejoice" in Latin. In the Gospel reading, we hear that John the Baptist is in prison, awaiting execution. He seems very perplexed. He had heard that Jesus is living a life that seems to be a complete contrast to his own. Jesus, the one he had baptized and whom he believed to be the Messiah, does not seem to be behaving in a way that Jewish tradition had taught him to expect. John sends a message to Jesus: "Are you the one who is to come?" The message that he receives is that "the blind see again, the lame walk, the deaf hear", offering signs that the Messiah has indeed arrived. John can only rejoice! Jesus assures John that all that has been prophesied has come to pass and he is the anointed one. As we approach the feast of Christ's birth, it might be

helpful to consider how I imprison my own darkness within myself or what am I afraid of? This is what Jesus comes to free in us so that we may live our lives in light and peace. Rejoice indeed!



Remember in Your Prayers

- We pray that those in distress are supported by their communities and families and receive the help they need.

<u>Marriage Tip</u> – Don't let the chaos that often accompanies the Christmas rush disrupt your peace and love. If you realize that you have spoken harshly or impatiently to your spouse or child, ask God to grant you more peace and ask your spouse or child for forgiveness.

<u>Stewardship Reflection</u> – "You too must be patient. Make you hearts firm, because the coming of the Lord is at hand." (James 5.8) Patience is one of those things many of us struggle with. We want things to go according to our plan and our schedule. We like things to be convenient. Any change brings anxiety and fear. Through daily prayer God reveals to us what he wants us to do with the gifts he has given us. We are able to better align ourselves with God's will and his plan, which is far better than anything we can come up with on our own.

<u>Did You Know?</u> – *The Christmas Tree* – Originating in Northern Europe in the 16th century, it is a decorated evergreen, or now, in modern times, an artificial tree of similar appearance. The tradition of the Christmas tree was introduced to North America in 1781 in Quebec, when an army general and his wife held a Christmas party and delighted guests with a fir tree decorated with lighted candles and fruits. Today, there is a wide variety of traditional and modern ornaments. An angel or star placed at the top of the Christmas tree represents the Angel Gabriel or the Star of Bethlehem from the Nativity. "A Charlie Brown Christmas" (1965) immediately influenced our culture. For example, the term "Charlie Brown Christmas tree" describes any poor-looking or scraggly little tree resembling the one in the holiday special.
