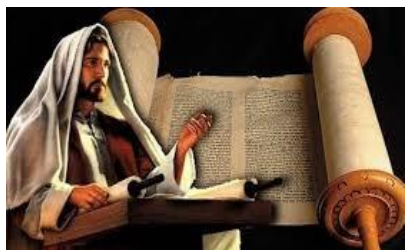

February 15, 2026: 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time



“Do not think I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill.”

In Old Testament times the Jews did not understand the Law in simply legalistic terms. They knew that it was something more than rules and regulations; they believed that it was God’s loving instruction, God’s guidance of God’s people. And so they would pray, as we shall do this Sunday in the response of the Psalm, “They are happy who follow God’s law!” Jesus himself tells us that in the end the

whole of the law and the Prophets hangs on the double commandment of loving God and loving our neighbour. Moreover, it is in rising to this twofold love that we prove our love for him. “If you love me,” he will tell his friends in John’s Gospel, “keep my commandments.” This is a hard love, a demanding love. The Lord not only makes demands of us, he also enables us to live out those demands in our daily lives. When “Yes” means “Yes” and “No” means “No”, God is properly served. Yes, this calls us to integrity.

The Church invites us to fasting and abstinence on the first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday, as on Good Friday. Christian fasting and abstinence obtain their full meaning when we deprive ourselves of food or earthly pleasures

in order to be more open to prayer, to share more in the suffering of those who are starving, and to save money to give to the poor. Fasting and abstinence build up self-discipline and strength of faith and character.

- ❖ **Anointing of the Sick:** This weekend, February 14-15, Fr. Gabriel will offer this sacrament of healing to those who are currently faced with illness, weakened by age, or in distress.
- ❖ **Receiving the Body and Blood of Christ:** We are re-introducing Communion under both species regularly in our parish beginning next weekend, with the First Sunday of Lent. If Sunday is to be occupied by other activities, couldn't we still take a short moment to offer our day to the Lord? Could we find another time in the week for mass and for rest, caring for our spiritual and physical health?
